Tom Kohler



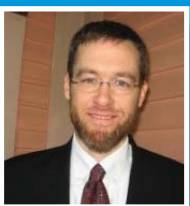

Bob is a Senior Consultant with Griffin-Hammis Associates, LLC and serves as the Director of the Minnesota Employment Training and Technical Assistance Center. Bob has provided training and consultation services in 43 states and 2 Canadian provinces, and has previously led the transformation of a traditional day program into a high quality community employment service.
