
This report is dedicated to the founding families of Community Living Parry Sound. You inspired our work for 60 years; Your passion will fuel us for 60 more.

Many of the challenges our agency, and indeed our community, was facing when I started in 1990 remain relevant today. Inclusion is the standard we strive for, and we're not there yet.



When you reflect on how difficult it has been to access affordable food, housing, and transportation this year, remember that these challenges are exacerbated for people with disabilities. Our agency's work is cut out for us.

That is not to say we haven't come a long way—we have. Sheltered workshops and day programs are long in our rear-view mirror. Our principle is for the people we support to direct their own lives inside and outside of our services.

As I am always telling our staff, "your job is to do yourself out of a job." Success looks like a person being able to access community resources as much as persons without disabilities have the freedom to.

One of the biggest sources of inspiration this year has come from the people we support. Their resilience is second to none. Their patience with ever-changing guidelines is generous. Their conscientiousness to "stop the spread" sets an example for us all.

Our staff members have also been community role models. They've read the equivalent of textbooks worth of infection prevention protocols, and they live the protocols each work day. Without the reliability and diligence of our staff, we couldn't operate today.



Our Board remains the strong foundation that our work is built upon. I have enjoyed working closely with the Board this year and remain grateful for their service to CLPS.

2022/2023 will be a big year with ongoing Executive Director succession as the Board vets and hires a permanent candidate. The pandemic will no doubt remain an area of focus. With any luck COVID-related work will centre around the “new normal” of a post-pandemic era.

Above all, our direction is to provide excellent in-community experiences. I urge employees of all teams and tenures to act as champions in making our strategic goals a reality.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year for the Board began with an Indigenous Education Day September 24, leading to greater understanding and the development of our Land Acknowledgement.

We held a Fun Run fundraiser last September. Thank you to everyone who organized, participated in, and supported the successful initiative - particularly in light of our inability to host our annual golf tournament fundraiser in 2021.


The Community Living Ontario AGM was held September 29, which I attended in an effort to learn more about the provincial agency and how the different levels of governance interact to guide CLPS. We were excited to have a Technology Lab opening November 26, and happy to see the positive effects that the program has had for the organization and people we support.

A virtual staff party was all the organization could safely hold December 10, though it seemed to go off well. At the suggestion of our Executive Director (ED), we were able to provide some holiday gifts for those who would otherwise not have had any.

The leaders of our organization continued preparations to better understand how the new Not-for-Profit Corporations Act will affect our organization, and ensure we are in compliance well ahead of the October 2024 deadline.



February 20 saw the resignation of our long-time Executive Director Jo-Anne Demick. We were sad to see her go, and thank her for all the years of tireless dedication. We appointed Brad Horne as Acting Executive Director on April 1, 2022. He brings a wealth of experience with the organization, and was welcomed into his new role with a Compliance Inspection April 27, 2022. We are confident that his notable involvement with the Ontario Agencies Supporting Individuals with Special Needs (OASIS), which included chairing this year's conference, will be helpful to CLPS in the coming years.



We have conducted another Governance Policy Review this year, as we do every three years, and I thank everyone involved in that process.

CLPS received significant and generous donations this year for which we are very grateful. Many were in memory of Terry Brenn, Marg Matthews, Patrick Murray, and Peter Snow, showing the impact they had on CLPS and the community generally.

Thanks to a generous donation from Toin Coss International we were able to have a boat cruise party aboard the Island Queen on July 16.

Mitzi Dinsmore's long-standing contributions to the Finance Committee came to an end (at least for now) this year, and we offer her our thanks for her service. Thank you very much as well to our departing Board members Danny Gray and Doris Muckenheim for all your work over the years!

We are looking forward to the 60th Annual AGM Sept 29, 2022, including the raffle of a beautiful Jessica Vergeer painting. Please join us in welcoming two new outstanding candidates to the Board team - Matt Fisher and Rose Bailey.


WHO WE ARE

Our History

Sixty years ago, Community Living Parry Sound was born out of the intense interest, hard work and commitment of ordinary citizens: the parents and volunteers who keenly understood the needs of people for whom they sought to provide services.

What began as an entirely volunteer organization has evolved gradually through the years to an agency offering a number of services staffed by roughly 60 paid employees. Volunteers still play a central role in the agency as members of the Board of Directors, members of the committees of the Board, and friends and advocates of the people for whom services are provided.

Over the years and through much learning and innovation, our services have become person directed. That means that each person we work with directs their own service delivery and tells us what the right amount of support looks like for them.


CLPS Today

Community Living Parry Sound provides support to people with developmental disabilities and their families.

Our purpose is to support people with disabilities to build better lives in their community. We do this through partnerships, innovation and education. Our vision is a community where all people have the power and freedom to determine the life they want.

One of our core objectives is to support community inclusion by facilitating excellent in-community experiences.

True inclusion respects every person's unique abilities and contributions. It means being valued, welcomed, and belonging to our community and community groups. True inclusion is the goal we strive for.



Our support services vary widely depending on what the person we support directs us to do. This is called person-directed support, and it is the guiding principle of our services.

Some of our most common support services include daily living supports, skill development, recreation, and building connections with friends and neighbours at community events.



The Supported Independent Living team provides services to people who live in the greater Parry Sound community.

Our Residential Program provides 24/7 supports in our two group homes.



Family & Youth Services supports children and youth under 18, along with their families. They provide family respite and help families navigate Developmental Services Ontario's application processes.

We help community members manage their Passport funds through our Individualized Services.

Finally, our Planning Team helps people identify their long-term aspirations, then supports the person as they work toward their goals.

Lianne Piddington, Treasurer




JOIN OUR COMMUNITY

A VERY FOND FAREWELL

In 2022 we said goodbye to our Executive Director of 20 years, Jo-Anne Demick. It was less of a "goodbye" and a more of a "see you around" as Jo-Anne remains active in the Developmental Services Sector in her role as Director of Stakeholder Relations at Community Living Ontario.

Jo-Anne Demick started at Community Living Parry Sound in the spring of 1978. In her 20 years as Executive Director, she led the agency as an advocate and visionary.

Jo-Anne was there building relationships with the founding families of our organization—growing the trust and respect that we enjoy as status quo today.

It is hard to even contemplate the changes that occurred in Jo-Anne's 44-year career. The agency's identity is so profoundly different today than it was—everything from our name to our services to our philosophy has moved toward inclusivity and empowering others.

People with disabilities were once absent from our community. Parents were encouraged to send their children away from home and off to large institutions for life.

Over time, and with support from Community Living Parry Sound, people with disabilities became present in our community, having the services they needed to remain here in Parry Sound.

Despite physical presence in the community, segregation was the culture of the day: schools, jobs, and daily living were separate and segregated from the community at large. Jo-Anne is known provincially for her advocacy and networking, understanding the most current issues and needs facing the Developmental Services Sector.



Through her ongoing foresight, research, discourse, and proactivity, our agency embraced the person-centred philosophy, which posits that services should be individualized to the person.



Moving ever further, Jo-Anne introduced us to the person-directed movement, which tells us that the person receiving services should have an active role in designing those services. Our latest strategic direction is to provide “just the right amount of support.”

Translated into corporate speak, the concept is to “always be leaving,” allowing the person to set their own path more and more. And while we adopt this latest ethos from Jo-Anne’s compassionate and proactive vision, we also experience the bittersweet consequences of a leader who is leaving, making room for the next generation to soar.

What may seem like small paradigm shifts make a huge impact between what *is* and what *was*. This writer would argue that none of this development could have happened without Jo-Anne’s unique cocktail of service, passion, compassion, humility, discernment, respect, and above all, idealism.

To quote George Bernard Shaw:

"You see things and say 'Why?' But I dream things that never were and I say, 'Why not?'"

These pages are not enough for an adequate homage to Jo-Anne and the indelible mark her work will leave on this agency. Knowing that words cannot measure up, we end with this:

Thank you, Jo-Anne.

TECHNOLOGY LAB OPENS AT COMMUNITY LIVING PARRY SOUND

Project brings people together online

At the start of the pandemic when many services moved online, community living Parry Sound found some of those they served didn't even have a phone, let alone the technology or skills to transition to virtual support.

To fix that, Community Living received in 2020 a \$130,000 Ontario Trillium Foundation grant to hire a consultant to find a way to move services online through a new Community Connect app with pre-screened access to online services, purchase devices to lend out and create a Technology Learning Lab.

Community Living purchased devices, such as laptops and smart watches, for 19 people and now the Lab, where the skills to operate the technology offered can be learned, is open. At the Lab, clients will receive both one-on-one support and lessons in small group workshops.

The lab was officially opened Nov. 26 in Community Living's first in-person event since the start of the pandemic. The grand opening was filmed and shared live online.

"Albert Einstein says that in the midst of every crisis lives an opportunity and we have experienced a crisis which will define generations to come," said executive director Jo-Anne Demick.

"For people with intellectual disabilities and developmental disabilities people often live in poverty and in isolation within our community and the pandemic has just highlighted that isolation so this grant and this project has been so critical to keeping people connected."

The foundation offered the grant through its Resilient Communities Fund to support non-profits.

"Clearly you have been incredibly busy, and here we are today with new options to stay connected," said Foundation volunteer Leah Welk.

Parry Sound-Muskoka MPP Norm Miller attended via a pre-recorded video message.

"Those who could not previously benefit from online programs, now have the tools at their disposal to connect virtually," said Miller. "As we move forward towards the end of the pandemic, these initiatives will help our community recover by building opportunities for everyone to access online spaces and removing barriers to access for all."



SOMETHING GOOD IS COOKING IN LIZ'S KITCHEN

Liz Desmasdon loves cooking and baking. Liz is a regular at our Community Kitchen--a weekly event that brings people in to prepare and share a meal together. You might think that a communal cooking program would be one of the first things to go in a pandemic, but in this case you'd be mistaken! With hard work from Glenda Clayton and a team of Community Inclusion & Support Facilitators, the Community Kitchen program remained a staple CLPS activity in the midst of shutdowns. Community Kitchen has been hosted online since 2020 and is as popular as ever. Liz and other people joining in receive a box with the ingredients and a written recipe. Everybody cooks together through our virtual community, Community Connect. Liz said that the online delivery of Community Kitchen hasn't dampened her enthusiasm one bit. "Cooking makes me happy," she says.

Cook of the week

Those lucky enough to be invited to the apartment are asked what they would enjoy and, whatever they feel like; be it a full course meal, pizza, or light snack, Wendy has the know-how and recipes to ensure that the diner is not disappointed. Almost everyone loves date squares and Wendy's recipe always produces great ones.

FILLING
Cook 1 pound of dates with one cup of water and 1/2 cup of white sugar.

CAKE
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1 cup butter (melted)
1 cup brown sugar
1 1/2 cups oatmeal

1. In a mixing bowl, mix together flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Mix in melted butter.
2. In another bowl, mix together, brown sugar, and oatmeal. Then stir into the flour mixture.
3. Grease a 9 X 13-inch pan,

spread 1/2 of the crumbs into it. Cover with cooled date filling, and cover with remaining crumbs. Pat to smooth. Bake at 325° for 30-35 minutes. Cut into squares while hot and allow to cool in pan.

Community Living Parry Sound has a reputation of excellence in the Developmental Services sector.


Sometimes our work speaks for itself, but a picture is worth a thousand words!


